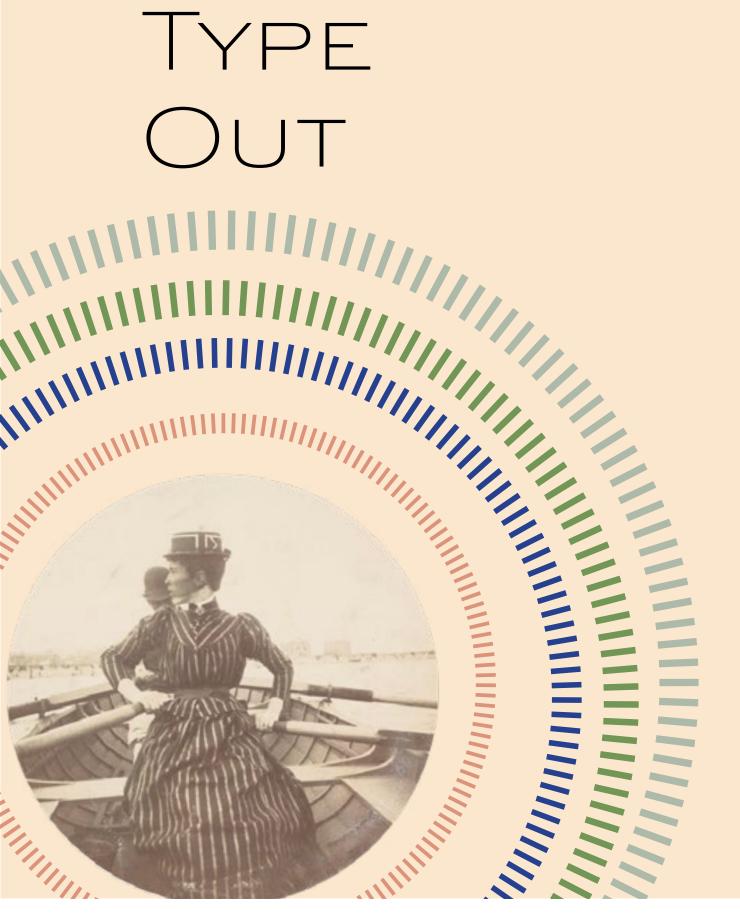

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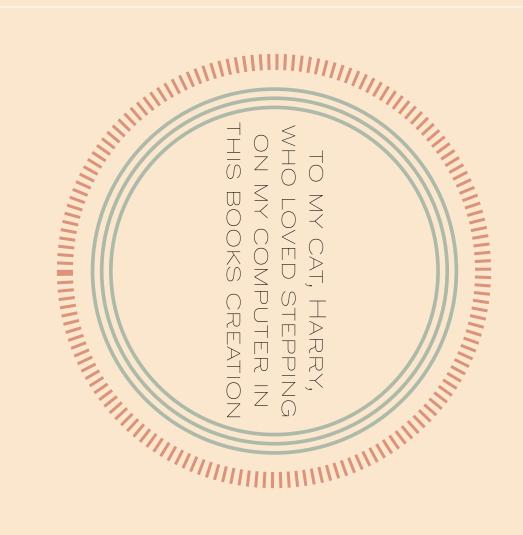


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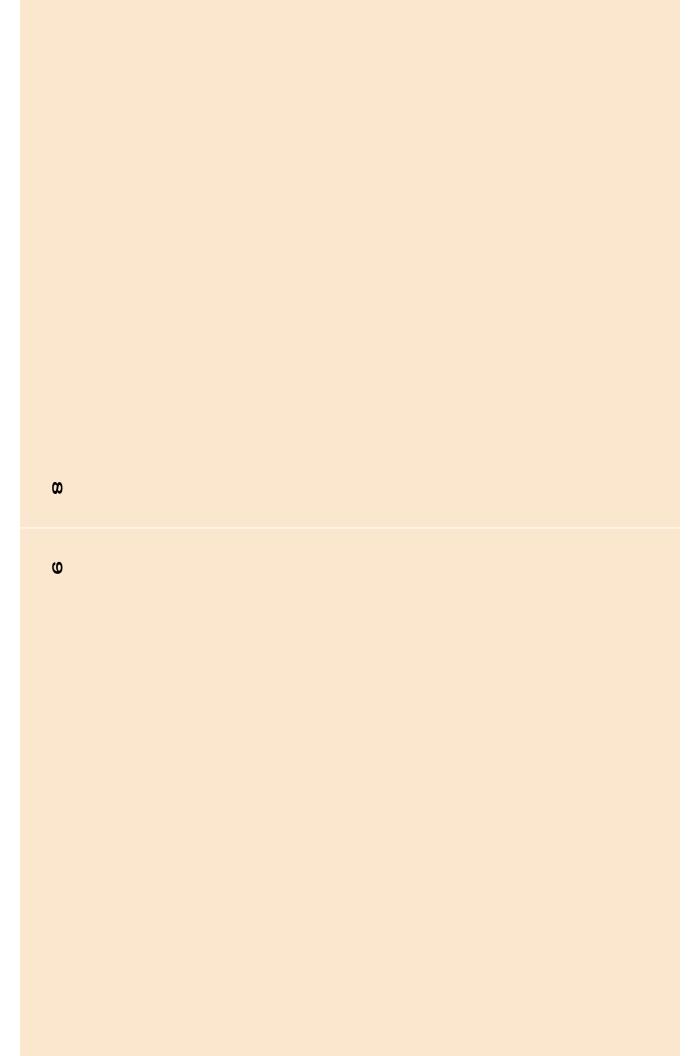
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INTRODUCTION

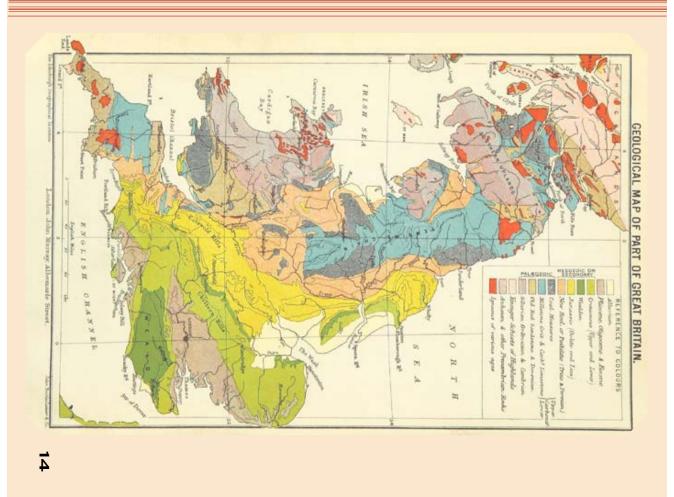

We must know where we have been, to know where we must go.

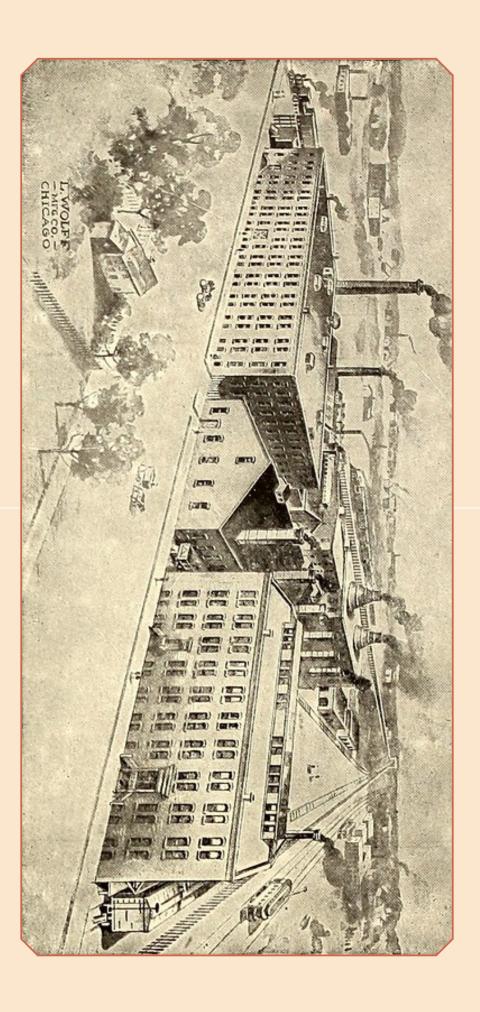

The industrial revolution was an important precursor to the edwardian era. The influence on life and work in their era derives from this period, so it is crucial to understand it.

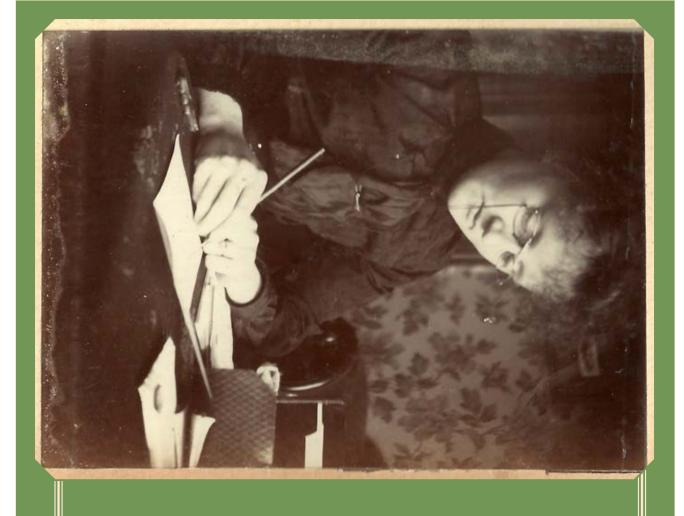

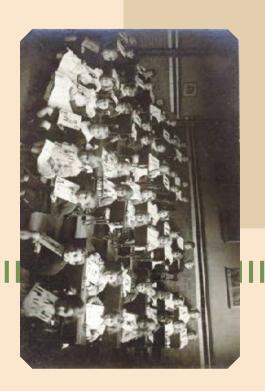

There were roughly 21 girls schools in britian with 5,000 students in their seats. With that said, most children from the lower class did not go on to complete further education due to their financial situations.





THE MIDDLE CLASS SITUATION

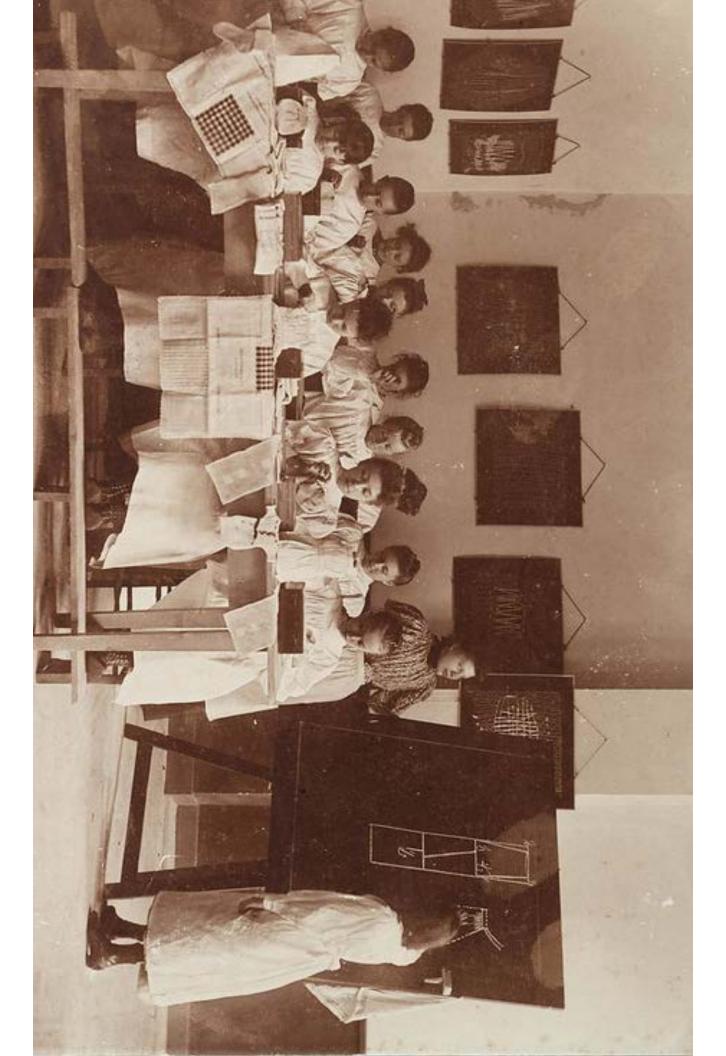

That is simply what they were. The goal was to have private tutors or governesses to teach them the ways of the ideal woman. Their educational promise was to marry up in society to maintain or make more money.



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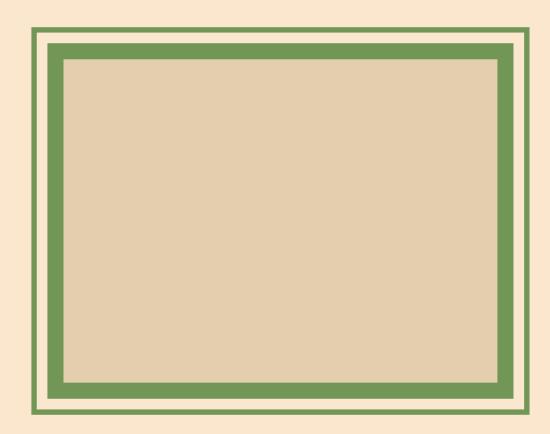
Boys

Nursemaid: Nursery support that cleaned nappies and kept the nursery clean.

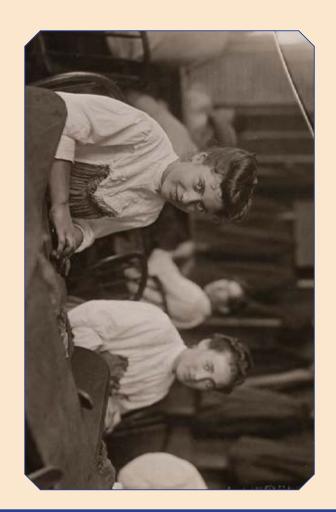
Dairy Maid: In charge of making butter and other dairy biproducts.

FACTORY WORK

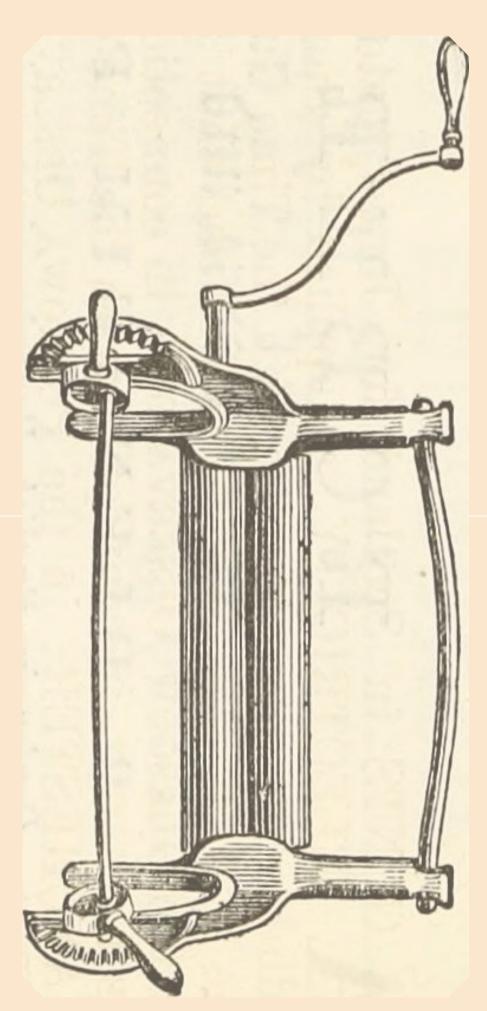

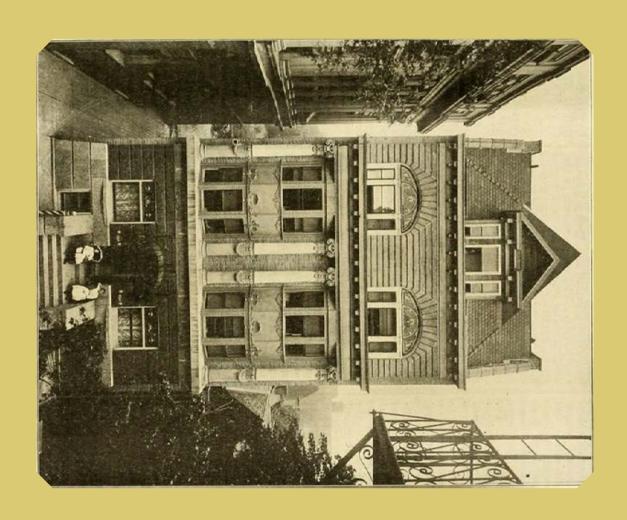

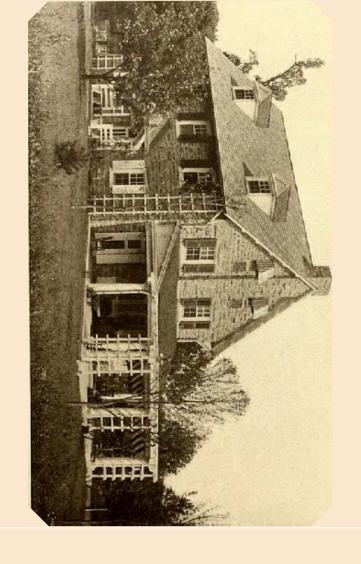

Otherwise, most trends were maintained by both classes.

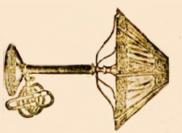

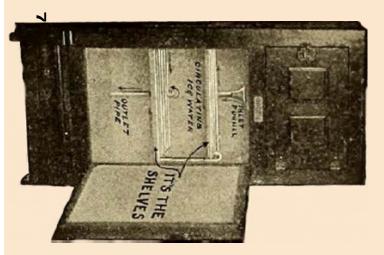

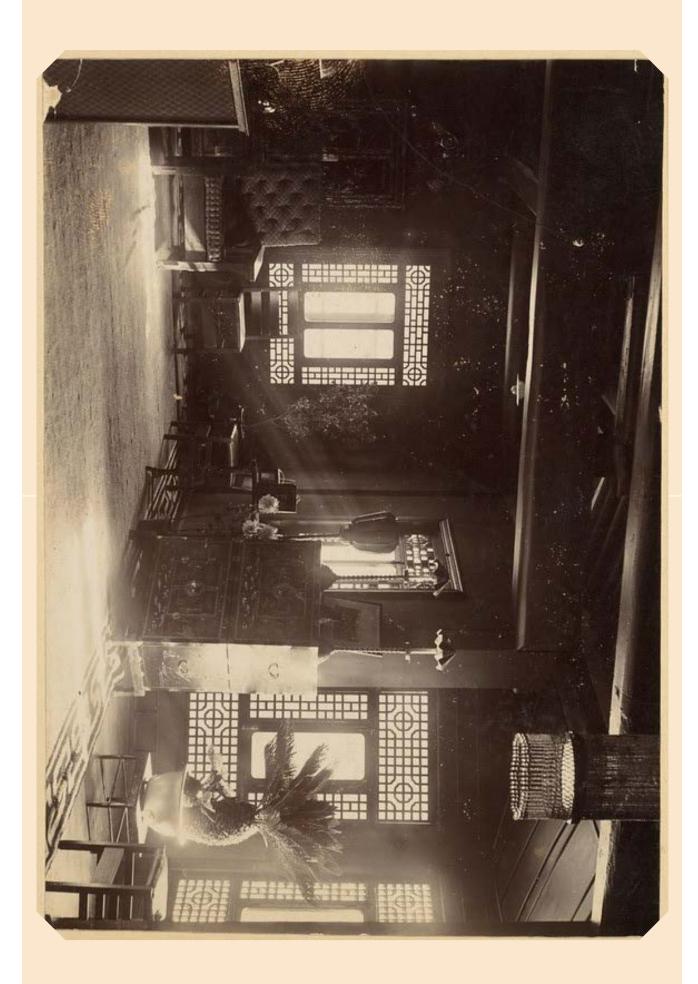




The new invention of electricty being used in homes was a big game changer for homes. The upper and middle class took joy in these new inventions.

FASHION

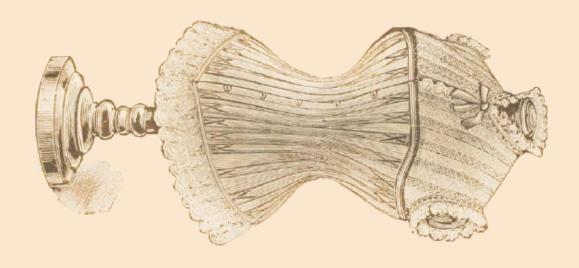

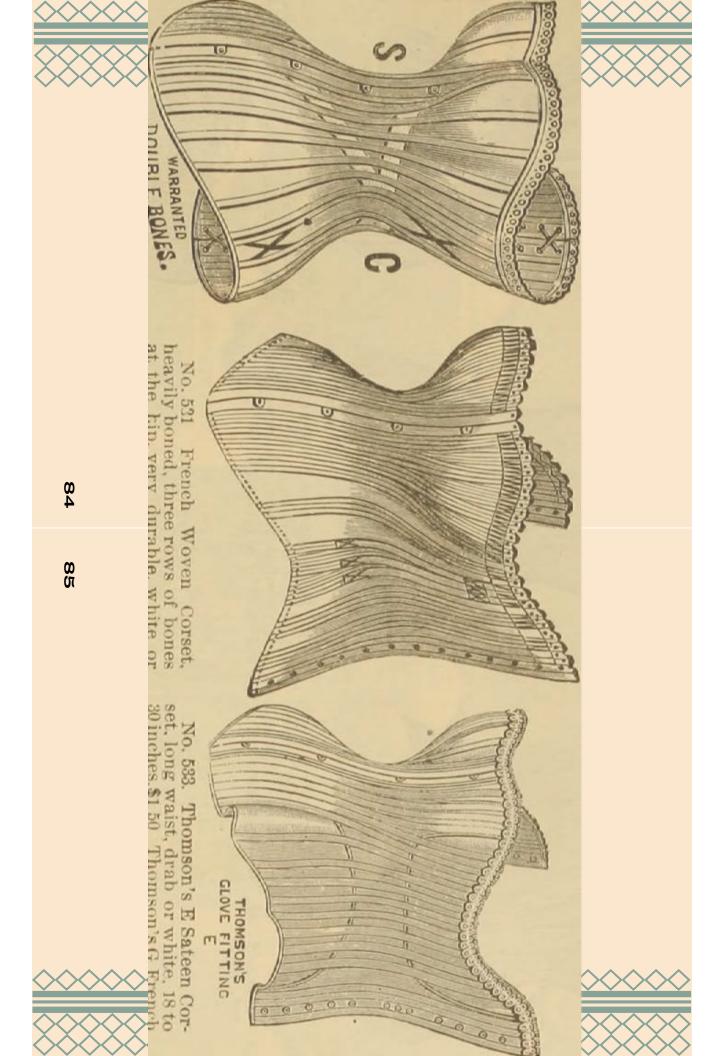
THE CORSET

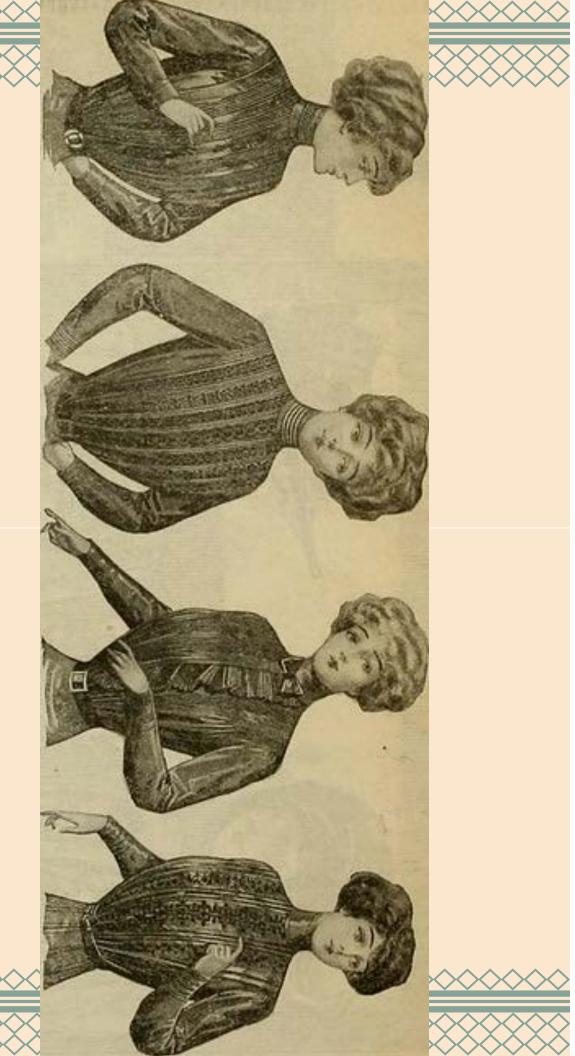
OUTERWEAR
